School Goals

Literacy: The three year average for MCA-Reading at RDLS will increase from 36.2% to 41.2% within three years. Math: The three year average for MCA-Math at RDLS will increase from 42.6% to 47.6% within three years. SEL Goal: The two year average of implementation of Second Step at RDLS will increase from 50% of classrooms to 100% within two years

Teachers, Families, Students—Together for Success

At Home

RDLS staff will be working with families throughout the year to develop ideas about how they can help their child(ren) succeed in school. Some of the ideas RDLS staff thought of are:

- Have fun with math and help your child to see when you use math. Have them cook with you, measure things, count money and change, tell time.
- Try to attend our Family Fun, Math & Literacy Nights.
- Read nightly with your child.
- Read the weekly or monthly newsletters and the information that is sent home.
- Check your child's take home folder or planner each night.
- Encourage your child to do their best and help us to teach them the power of the word "yet." Teach them to believe it's not that they can't do it, they just don't know how to do it "yet."
- Help my child(ren) get to school on time every day.
- Attend teacher conferences in November and March.
- Attend and participate in school activities.
- Participate in the PTSO and attend monthly meetings.
- Play family Math games sent home with students.
- Read classroom and school newsletters, the District website and school page & RDLS Facebook posts.
- Contact my child's teacher if I have questions or concerns.
- Keep family contact information updated with the school.

<u>Students</u>

RDLS staff will be working with students throughout the year to develop ideas about how they can succeed in school and reach their goals for reading and math. Some of the ideas RDLS staff thought of for students are:

- Be sure to read every night and talk with someone about what I read.
- Bring home my take home folder or planner and newsletters and show them to my family.
- Practice my math facts and play different math games at home.
- Arrive at school on time every day, ready to learn
- Follow the school-wide behavior expectations to supporting my learning and others' opportunities to learn
- Try my best in class and ask for help when needed
- Fully participate in classroom activities
- Read to someone at home every night
- Bring home Math games and materials to play with my family to reinforce my Math skills
- Talk with my family about my school day and what I am learning
